Normative Theory - Four Theories of the Press

Some historically based typologies of normative thinking about the media such as Four Theories are widely recognized as flawed in part because these typologies locate the beginning of contemporary normative theory in the rise of the libertarian ideal and ignore or judge negatively the historical origins of Western normative theory in classical thinkers such as Plato and Aristotle (Nerone 1995, 21-28).

2.1 Normative media theory Media theory refers to the complex of social-political-philosophical principles which organize ideas about the relationship between media and society. Within this is a type of theory called 'normative theory', which is concerned with what the media ought to be doing in society rather than what they actually do.
